Following the business portion of our meeting Moira Denson will present Visual notetaking for artists: staying active with ink, watercolor pencils, watercolor markers and a splash of water. About Moira:

workplace, hospitality and residential building types at firms such as Gordon and Greenberg Architects, Design Collective Inc., and most recently Perkins + Will. She teaches undergraduate and graduate students in design methods, healthcare and retail studios, and sketching and rendering for ideation. Her research interests target improving the design process and exploring the impacts of design on overall health and well-being.

March 7th Meeting

Topics for discussion at our March meeting included our 6th Annual Show at La Galeria at Ranazul Restaurant, OAA's Show at Sandy Spring Museum, and a show at the Arts Barn at Kentlands in Gaithersburg and much more.

After the Business portion of our meeting, the always dynamic speaker, Glen Kessler, presented "Simple Steps To Success". Glen covered the steps necessary to successfully enter our artwork into art shows. He began with photographing our work, starting with lighting and placement of camera and art, continuing on to how change the digital file size to comply with the rules of submission of artwork. Then showed us how to organize an inventory of work to keep track of where individual pieces are. Glen then showed us venues on line that announce shows that are calling for entries and concluded by actually entering some of his art into a show.

After going through the biographies I see that the vast majority of you are not represented! Please tell us something about yourself. And if you are a long-time member, please consider updating your bio.

What to write? There are many articles online. The following excerpt is taken from

An artist bio, when written and created correctly will provide the read-

er with a greater understanding as vation for creating their art and finally it will provide a guide or a means for a viewer to interpret the artist's art. In these terms, the importance of an artist's bio cannot be stressed enough!

What should be included in an effective artist's bio?

1. Anyone or anything that has influenced the artist's artworks.

2. Any education or training in the field of art.

3. Any related experience in the field of art.

4. A summary of the artist's artistic philosophy.

5. Any artistic insights or techniques that are employed by the artist.

6. A short description of what the artist would like to accomplish with their art.

Another article suggests to keep your biography to around 120 words, noting that museum researchers discovered that viewers lose interest in reading wall labels after 150 words. Also, write in third person. Do not say "I".

Please give some thought to writing or updating your biography. Feel free to add a photo of yourself, and/or some of your artwork. You can bring it to the May 2nd meeting, or print it out and mail it to me. Barbara Kahla

For those of you who have never exhibited your artwork before, or those of you haven't done so in a while, or those who are frequent exhibitors, now is the time to take a long look at your framed works and figure out which one you want offer for sale. Then bring it to the library on Saturday, April 22, at 10:15 am. There are a few rules: artwork must be suitably matted and framed and be equipped with a hanging wire. No saw-tooth hangers will be permitted. Wrapped canvases must be finished on all sides and equipped with hanging wire. All artwork must be labeled on the back with your name, the title of the piece and your telephone number - we may need to contact you while we are hanging the exhibit.

Entry will be on a first come, first served basis. Each OAA member is allowed to exhibit one piece. If you wish to participate, please contact Sally Drew by noon on Friday, email is swdrew@verizon.net, telephone is 301-774-2125. She will need the following information: artist's name, title of the artwork, medium, price, contact information (email, telephone or both). If you wish to have your artwork shown on the OAA website, please send a jpg to Sally. You must have already given us permission to show your artwork on the site. This is a terrific way to show your work to the general public so make sure it is presented in a professional manner. As one juror stated, "If you aren't proud enough in your work to present it properly, why should I care enough to buy it?"

Exhibition: September 24 - October 29 Underwritten by TTR Sotheby's International Realty, The Athenaeum Invitational celebrates the visual arts of Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia. Tips from Penny Kritt How Many Shapes Do You Need?

There are some standard things that we all love to paint. Consider a barn. Who can resist that? It doesn't matter if it's a new structure or so old that it's falling down. Whatever color red it is – or used to be -- will always stand out against the green pasture. It might have interesting vertical texture from its wooden sides. Maybe there are even those nifty white painted Xs on the barn doors.

The challenge is now to avoid getting your own version of a trite subject. It's time to look at a different expression of the subject.

Add some signs of life (see Figure 1 below). Including a pasture with horses or cows changes the focal point and spreads out the composition. Or put some white chickens in the yard right next to the barn for some value contrast. While a barn that's deserted and falling down is very interesting to paint, it's also more melancholy.

Who says barn paintings always have to be from the outside? Look at Figure 2 below and all the textures in this interior shot! Wood, metal, hay, dirt and of course the texture of the horse's coat. That will give you all sorts of challenges!

In Figure 1, we had lots of items to paint. There was the barn, the lawn, the fence, the horse, trees and the road. Each of those shapes could either add or detract from the overall composition.

In Figure 2, there are fewer shapes but they are more complex. You should treat the wooden stall fronts as a single and very interesting shape. The ceiling may become too important with the contrasting dark beams and skylights. Or perhaps you'll decide that it is essential because it balances the impact of the horse shape.

Try a barn portrait. Instead of the standard landscape format (wider than tall), change the orientation as in Figure 3 below. This format gives you space to capture all the unique elements of a structure that's seen a lot of use.



It also solves another pesky problem of creating a background. Just indicate something with color or shape. Close enough is good enough since we're concentrating on the structure!
