We have nearly 70 members, but only 30 images in the Member Gallery. We'd love to see everyone represented, and also regularly updated.

Proposed Amendment to the OAA Constitution

OAA, established in 1974, is now 46 years old. The executive board has been considering a way to honor those who have been a long-time part of OAA over the years. Discussion has begun about a proposed amendment to the OAA constitution regarding the establishment of a Lifetime Membership category. Currently the constitution defines members as "anyone interested in the objectives of the OAA and who is at least 18 years of age" and who pays the annual membership dues.

In this discussion the executive board has written the following as a proposed amendment:

Lifetime Membership will be extended to those who have been members for over 25 years and as a privilege for their contributions and longtime membership in good standing the annual membership fee will be waived.

This special category of membership will waive the annual membership fee but NOT any show fees or percentage of sales from a show. Some other art groups base a lifetime membership on age, but OAA does not request age on the membership form so we do not have nor keep a record of

ages. The board investigated how many members this would affect. Currently it would give 8 such memberships and going forward it may add one or two per year, some years having none over the course of the next ten years. According to OAA constitution, amendments are to be voted on by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting. The amendment must be submitted in writing to the executive board at least 60 days prior to the annual business meeting (usually held in January), and the proposed amendment shall also be submitted in writing at least 30 days in advance of that meeting to the general membership.

It was felt strongly that we would prefer to have this vote when we can be together in person again and decided to put a vote off until January of 2021. Towards that end, we want to invite your feedback on this proposed amendment. Please reach out to Sandy Yagel with your thoughts and comments between now and October at:





Setting Up a Still Life By Penny Kritt

If you're like most people, you set up some objects, get your art equipment and hope that what you create will work. But you might find that you get farther faster when you start out with one or more studies. Why? It's because you are giving yourself the freedom to experiment with objects, their placement and the lighting that best serves your purpose. Since you feel no pressure to build a final composition at this point, you can just relax and have fun.

Let's start by choosing some objects (Fig. 1 below). One way to build a cohesive composition is with a commonality of the objects that have enough individuality to be interesting. We'll be bold and try a collection of objects that don't usually make it into a piece of art.

At first glance, there isn't much continuity, but look again! Each item has a connection with at least one other. For example, Nos. 1, 4 and 7 have a spiral element. Nos. 2, 3, and 4 have yellow while Nos. 8, and 9 have red. Nos. 1, 4, 5 and 6 are round. Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 7 have

strong vertical direction while 8, 9 and part of 7 are horizontal.

Now let's eliminate a few items and practice painting or drawing the others. For example, tool No. 4 is elegant and sculptural. But it will be very difficult to get an accurate gold color with all those nifty spiral lines -- so out it goes!

Fig. 2 above just might work. All the yellow tools were eliminated so the red would be stronger against the black and silver. Use your finger cover the little red patch on the wrench. Without a second red element, the whole design seems to tilt to the right. Because red is the strongest color, if you just put it one place, that's all the viewer will see. So instead of removing it, just add more elsewhere and *now the whole image is back in focus!* It's all about balance, not just individual components.

Every item has a rounded element, and all except the nuts

also have a straight component. Each group of nuts makes a kind of pattern, which is another concept that draws the eye. If there were only one group of nuts, it would also make the image off kilter.



The images below (Figs. 3-6) are exactly

the same as Fig. 2 above, just rotated from landscape to portrait. Then each one has a different orientation, flipped horizontally and/or vertically.

The great thing about art is that the artist's preference is



always the right one! I prefer either Fig. 4 or 5; I like the extra white space as a top border, not on the bottom. In Figs. 3 and 6, it seems like the red handled auger might fall and stab the horizontal black auger below. But you may choose it exactly because it gives a sense of danger and impending doom. I've learned to quantify what I do or don't like by how it makes me feel. That standard helps me arrive at a successful conclusion much faster.

My favorite is Fig. 5 because of the orientation of the red handled auger. It seems like it will catch both the spring and the nuts if they should slip out of place. The red handle also seems like a backstop that directs the eye back up into the picture space. By contrast, in Fig. 6, the rotated black auger handle seems like it's directing the viewer out of the image.

Creating this column took several hours to complete. In my opinion, this exercise in crafting the optimal components and their relative positions is a critical part of a successful project. Kinda like enjoying the trip, not just the destination. . .
