January 15th Member Meeting

This will be our first meeting scheduled for the third Wednesday at the Olney Library from 7-8:30. Our speaker will be Irina Stotland. Her topic is *Paul Gauguin: What makes Gauguin modern?* He attempts to synthesize multicultural sources into a harmonious work of art. Gauguin's works simultaneously draw on western illusionism with non-western stylization, western Christianity and non-western mythology, and western expectations of beauty and nonwestern female bodies. His similarly revolutionary use of color and form relies on western theories of vision and non-western flatness and patterning. In challenging traditions Gauguin created a new pictorial language of personal symbols and foreshadowed the ab-

straction and conceptualism of the twentieth century art movements. Irina received her doctorate in the History of Art from Bryn Mawr College, Bryn Mawr PA. A specialist in nineteenth-century French art, her research interests include Post-Impressionism and self-portraiture.



Her article on Paul Gauguin's self-portraits appears in Gauguin's Challenge. New Perspectives After Postmodernism (ed. Norma Broude, 2018). She is currently teaching at Montgomery College LLI, Rockville MD and lecturing at various museums and educational organization.

Events

The Touch of Color: Pastels at the National Gallery of Art, National Gallery of Art, West Building, Ground Floor, East Outer Tier, September 29, 2019 – January 26, 2020 . Known for its brilliant colors and its delicate, velvety texture, pastel is one of the most versatile and beautiful materials in the history of art. Artists have found innumerable ways to use it, from glowing portraits in the eighteenth century to the shimmering landscapes of the impressionists, to the abstract compositions of the twentieth century. Fabricated from a paste of pigment, white opaque filler, and binder, shaped into sticks and dried, pastel is an almost endlessly adaptable medium: it can be used wet or dry, by drawing directly with the intact stick, or by grinding it to a powder and applying it with a brush.

Featuring 64 exquisite examples drawn entirely from the permanent collection, The Touch of Color: Pastels at the National Gallery of Art traces the history of pastel from the Renaissance to the 21st century and examines the many techniques that artists have developed to work with this colorful medium. Included are drawings by eighteenth-century virtuosos such as Rosalba Carriera and Jean-Étienne Liotard; innovative works by Edgar Degas, James McNeill Whistler, and others whose experiments and technical skills revived interest in the medium in the nineteenth century; and rare examples by artists who only took up pastels on occasion, among them Henri Matisse and Roy Lichtenstein.

Lighting Effects By Penny Kritt

It's a good day to do art! You've got a great idea of what to paint (or draw) and you're all ready to begin. There's an obvious center of interest and all the shapes work well together. Finally, a composition that will practically paint itself!

Except... What time of day will it be? And if it's a land-scape, what will the weather be like? Rats! Now what?

Honestly, for me, this is the easiest part of designing a composition because *I can picture scenes in my head* without having to drag out art materials and waste time waiting for paint to dry to test ideas. You can do it, too.

The secret is to think of objects as simple shapes. Then imagine where the light comes from. Don't worry about all the details at this point. Below are two versions of the same scene. What's different is the effect of light coming from different directions.

The first is kind of moody, isn't it? The light is coming from directly behind the mountains. That reduces most objects to mere silhouettes. It simplifies shapes and makes the scene almost an abstract.



Now let's look at the same shapes, but the light is coming from directly in front.



This has an entirely different emotional quality from the other. First, there are a lot more details visible in the objects. Now you see the siding on the house and the shrubs in front of the building. And it's more obvious that the big pine tree is in front of the house. Above you can see light from the window at the top of the door which makes the building a little more welcoming. In the front lit one, the door is exactly the same, but adding one little dot of light for the door knob makes the house more *approachable*.

Both versions show a reflection of light in the windows, but the upper one is a little eerie. Conversely, the light in the windows of the lower one is a happy reflection of the bright sky. The mountain shapes are exactly the same, but now the snow on the tops of the mountains is apparent. Likewise, the tree shape is the same, but there's more light branches. This time the tree is a nice landscaping element. In the upper one, the tree seems a lot less friendly. Amazing, isn't it, since the house and tree shapes are the same, but it the upper one is a little creepy while the lower one invites you in.

Now compare the walkways leading to the house. In the top one, being backlit makes the part nearest to the house the darkest part. It's another way to build that sense of foreboding. In the lower one, the walkway is lighter nearest the house. It isn't mandatory that the walkway shape changes values, but it reinforces the concept of how long that path is. The other element that does this is the old "railroad track" trick. Notice that the walkway gets narrower closer to the house. That's another way to add depth to the scene.

See, this mental exercise not only saves time and money, but it makes your art more expressive. And it's the best way to deal with those awful nights when it's 3 am and you can't sleep. Something positive and useful to occupy you without having to get out of bed.
