Topics discussed included on-going exhibits and August's OAA Sandy Spring Museum Exhibit, *Farms and Barns*.

Jean Hirons was the featured presenter at our May meeting. During the meeting, Jean demonstrated a landscape in pastel beginning with a hard pastel and alcohol underpainting. She explained the importance of making changes to photographs in terms of composition and color.

Jean is a painterly realist using soft pastel to create luminous landscapes. A native of New Eng-

land, Hirons often features its beautiful architecture in her paintings, or the farms of the Mid-Atlantic, where she now resides. She is a signature member of the Pastel Society of America and a member of the Master Circle of the International Association of Pastel Societies. Her work has been included in many national and international juried shows and her paintings are internationally collected.

OAA Farms & BarnsExhibit at Sandy Spring Museum

Members of the Olney Art Association are invited to take part in a year-long celebration of the area farming community with an exhibit at the Sandy Spring Museum during August 2015. The theme of this show is "Farms and Barns" to highlight the many beautiful farms with old buildings and rolling hills, creeks and streams that can be recorded in individual painting styles.

Paintings and photographs of old and current farms, barns, and outbuildings are eligible. All work must be original but reference photographs from the museum may be used in the creation of paintings, including pastels, watercolor, oil, colored pencil, acrylics, and mixed-media. Artwork submitted cannot exceed 36" in any direction. Each piece must be properly matted and framed with a hanging wire. Gallery-wrapped canvases are acceptable but must be painted on all sides.

This is a juried show. Prizes to be awarded – \$100 for first place, \$75 for second place, \$50 for third place, \$25 for three honorable mentions. All work is to be submitted in person on Sunday, July 26 from noon to 2:00 pm, at the Sandy Spring Museum Pick up of non-accepted work will be July 26 from 3:00 to 4:00 pm.

Only Art Association Members can submit up to three pieces for the low entry free of \$25. 3 paintings are the limit for any individual artist. After June 15, registration fee will go up to \$35 for all artists.

OLNEY ART ASSOCIATION REGISTRATION FARMS AND BARNS

Farms and Barns, a juried show at Sandy Spring Museum, will tell the story of structures and life, past and present, within a 7-mile radius of the Museum. Artwork can be in all two-dimensional media, including oil, acrylic, pastel, watercolor, colored pencil, pen and ink, pencil, mixed media and photography. OAA members may submit up to three pieces.

All artwork must follow these guidelines:

Size – Each piece can be no larger than 36" in any direction, including frame.

Media – <u>Any</u> drawing or painting media is acceptable, including mixed media and photography.

Theme – The title and theme of this exhibit is Farms and Barns. All work is to conform to the title and theme.

All work is to be submitted in person at Sandy Spring Museum, on Sunday, July 26, 12:00–2 p.m. Work not accepted should be picked up on Sunday, July 26, from 3:00 – 4:00 pm. Registration fee for up to three pieces is \$35.

In Light of the Past: Celebrating 25 Years of Photography at the National Gallery of

Art, on view in the West Building from May 3 through July 26, 2015, will commemorate more than two decades of the Gallery's robust photography program. Some 175 of the collection's most exemplary holdings will reveal the evolution of the art of photography, from its birth in 1839 to the late 1970s. In Light of the Past is one of three stellar exhibitions that will commemorate the 25th anniversary of the National Gallery of Art's commitment to photography acquisitions, exhibitions, scholarly catalogues, and programs.

The Memory of Time: Contemporary Photographs at the National Gallery of Art, Acquired with the Alfred H. Moses and Fern M. Schad Fund, on view in the West Building from May 3 through September 13, 2015, will explore the complexity of the medium's relationship to time, memory, and history. Seventy-six works by 26 international artists will be presented at the Gallery for the first time. The Memory of Time is one of three stellar exhibitions that will commemorate the 25th anniversary of the National Gallery of Art's photography program.

Since the Middle Ages, artists have used metalpoint to create some of the most beautiful and technically accomplished drawings ever made. Interest in the medium peaked during the Renaissance when it was embraced by Leonardo da Vinci, Raphael, and Albrecht Dürer. Revived in the nineteenth century, metalpoint continues to be practiced today.

Kritt's Tip by Penny Kritt

Painting the Wind

You might have noticed a pattern in the topics I've written about in the last few months. I love the challenge of painting something that almost isn't there! We've already dealt with how to paint clear glass and soap bubbles, but those you can actually photograph those things.

Now, let's paint air. Moving air. So what came to mind? A gusty thunderstorm? Someone blowing a kiss? A swirling tornado? Or maybe a child snuffing out a birthday candle?

Now stop! Just take a moment to think about how you would do this. I'll wait for you.

So how'd you do? What came to mind? And how would you paint it?

Okay, even I admit it, you can't paint air. But you can paint its effects on objects!

In Sea Oats, Sea Shell below, you see a gentle breeze that barely bends the tall grass. It isn't strong enough, however, to kick up any waves.

Vacation (above) shows just the opposite effect. I was inspired to paint – in the house – because a hurricane was headed our way. The gusty wind has kicked up huge waves, the grass is bent diagonally and the umbrella and newspaper are flailing.

Wind is usually shown by how much it makes an object bend. As always, the greater the angle of the diagonal, the more exciting the painting. In the first photo below, the mast is straight up and the sails are slightly billowed, so there isn't much wind. Both the seas and the composition are calm.



But in the second photo (below), even though it's a sunny day, the diagonal of the main mast tells us that there's still a lot of wind that makes the boat slice through the water. This image is more exciting. It makes you wonder how fast they're going, and whether the little craft will get pushed over and capsize.



So in your next painting, think about adding this kind of weather element.

If you prefer portraits, blowing kisses is best indicated by pursed lips, rounded cheeks and closed eyes. With birthday candles, keep the eyes open.
