OAA's Annual Juried Show at Kentlands Mansion




Tips from Penny Kritt There Are No Primary Colors from Manufacturers!

I know what you're thinking – of course you can buy primary colors in oils, acrylics and watercolor! Sadly, that's not true. And won't that explain a lot of the frustration you have when mixing two primaries doesn't give you the secondary color you want?

I'll prove it! There's surely been a time that you mixed a red and yellow to get a really bright orange, but all you got was a dull version of the color you wanted. Or maybe you wanted a luscious royal purple, but your red and blue only yielded a dusty version of lavender. Ever have trouble getting a bright green when mixing yellow and blue? So, you're beginning to see my point.

That's why many art books show the author's preferred color choices – even when they claim they only use primary colors so they can control mixing more accurately – don't have one red, one blue and one yellow! Even those "purists" have two of each "primary".


Let's just recognize that we can't buy primaries because manufacturers only sell secondary (a mixture of two primaries) colors. Although reds and yellows are "warm" colors, scarlets have a bit of yellow in them; rose or alizarin crimson have some blue. Hansa yellow has some red, and lemon yellow has a little blue that gives it a slight greenish cast. Cool Ultramarine blue is warm because it has some red, but manganese blue is made with a little yellow.



That's why some colors that seem like they should be easy to mix are so elusive. For example, peach is a light orange, right? Nope, it's actually a tertiary (all three primaries) color. If you wanted to make peach using scarlet and Hansa yellow, it will always be too bright. Peach has a drop of blue in it or it's just not peach.

The primary/secondary/tertiary issue gives us a big tool to use. While it might not seem obvious at first, usually compositions should have no more than about 10-15 percent of a painting as true primary/secondary colors! Save those bold and beautify colors to use at your focal point. When there are too many intense colors, it actually hurts the viewer's eyes and he'll immediately look away.

Let's look at some grapes. Whether you prefer green or purple, they are secondary colors. In each case, the group on the left are true secondary colors, either red and blue or just blue and yellow. The only difference is the ratio of one color to the other.



The groups on the right each have one grape that is a true secondary color, but the surrounding grapes all have a bit of the third primary. That means the duller purple grapes each have some yellow in the mix. For the green grapes, there's varying amounts of red added to make the colors more interesting. It's more comfortable to look at the groups on the right.

Look closely at On the Marsh below. Notice that all the colors are mid tones. There are no really dark or really light colors except in the middle of the sun. To make matters worse, there are no secondary colors – each one is a tertiary! Normally, that would make a truly boring mess.

What saves the composition is the unity of color. Because each color has an element of all three primaries, that makes a calming mid tone painting that has enough varieties of warm and cool colors to make it interesting.

Of course, the shapes had to work together. The rusty color in the upper left moves your eye to the sun and further right to the marsh grass. Then you see the dog so you move down to the boat and then back to the left to the reeds. It's not just a happy coincidence that the reeds gently move you back to the rust color so you can circle the painting and enjoy it again.

Here's a great color mixing exercise. Think about the color of wood in furniture. Oak has a lot of yellow in it. Rosewood has more reddish purple. Maple is a very light brown with a tiny bit of orange. And once you're done with that, do it again to create skin tones for various races.

APPLICATION FOR EXHIBITING AT SANDY SPRING MUSEUM

August 2 – September 2, 2017

OAA members may submit three (3) pieces of original artwork. No reproductions, prints or wet canvas will be allowed.

Entry fee is \$5 per piece up to three pieces. Registration and installation will be on August 1, 10:30 – 11:30 am. Reception will be on August 3 from 6:30 to 8:30 pm. Take-down and pick-up will be on September 5, 11:00 – 12:00 noon.

All entries must be professionally prepared for display, i.e., watercolors must be matted and framed; oils, acrylics and pastels must be framed; paintings on wrapped canvas must be finished on all sides; photographs must be framed. Size limitations are minimum of 11" x 14" framed, maximum of 50" wide x 70" high, framed. Plexiglas (not glass) is required on all pieces larger than 22" x 28" framed size. <u>All pieces must have hanging wires.</u>

All entries must be properly labeled on the back with the artist's name, title of artwork; medium, price and contact information (telephone preferred).

All entries must be for sale. Sandy Spring Museum (SSM) will handle the sale. 30% of the sales price will go to SSM as commission, with 70% to be retained for the artist. Checks for artwork sold will be mailed to the artist(s) at the end of the month during which the piece was sold, no later than the end of October 2016.

SSM encourages buyers to take possession of the purchased art AFTER the show ends. However, if a buyer needs to take the artwork with him/her, SSM will let it go. No other piece will fill that space.

Participating OAA members are required to contribute to the reception and in other activities pertaining to the exhibit, as needed.
