MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Fellow Artists,

In my first message, I wrote about using your "little minutes" for your art work. This time I'm writing about our need to observe not only the art and techniques of artists that are giving workshops and demos today, but those who long ago laid the groundwork of observation and study.

In Vasari's, "Lives of the Artists", the author writes this of Michaelangelo:

"It was no wonder that Michelangelo was so able. He studied continually. He copied a copper engraving by the German Martin Schongauer. The subject was Saint Anthony tormented by devils. First he drew it in pen and ink and then painted it. He studied actual fish scales to make the devil's scales more real. He also copied drawings of the old masters so perfectly that his copies could not be distinguished from the originals, since he smoked and tinted the paper to give it the appearance of age."

Take time to observe and, yes, even copy the old masters. You will be amazed at how much you learn.

New Venue For Artists

There's a new center for the visual arts in town. Capitol Arts Network, located in Rockville, has just opened. Capitol Arts Network (CAN) is a non-profit arts group that was founded in 2003 but had grown to the point of needing permanent headquarters. Their facility is in a newly renovated building at 12276 Wilkins Avenue, off of Parklawn Drive. A Matter of Labeling

In response to Marion Hawkes's letter (September 2011) and Yvonne Dorward's and McCrystle Wood's letters (July/August 2011), I'd like to add my thoughts about whether digitally enhanced photos should be admitted to fine art competitions or shows. I'm a current member and past president of a local art association in which we've also debated this issue. We decided to accept digitally enhanced and digital art in our shows on the condition that the works be labeled "digitally enhanced photo" or "digitally created image". Of course, some artists use nothing but computer software and a printer to create works of art. It's no doubt a slippery slope. We must view computer technology as a tool to create art.

Composition – Where, Why and How

The first day is how to tell what should be in the painting. For example, if you want to paint a still life about a rose, should you do a traditional vase of flowers, maybe show off your skills and put them in a sparkly crystal vase on a shiny mahogany table? Or maybe you've seen so many of those that you think it's a boring composition, and you just want to paint that interesting juncture where the stem connects to the flower petals. This workshop will help you see more clearly to define your vision for a unique and thought-provoking painting.

The second topic of the workshop is where ideas for great compositions come from. Ready to paint, but have no idea of what to paint? Or how do you get past that boring landscape and get a painting that's really worth framing? You'll never paint yourself into a corner again!

Tips from Penny Kritt


Painting a sunny landscape



If you want to show sunlight, you'll also need to show shadows. The bigger the value change, the brighter the sunshine will appear to the viewer.

The entire painting (above left) is light to mid tone. Even the shadow under the bush doesn't say "sunny day" because the foliage is just about the same value. Beginners often confuse a cooler color (blue or gray) with a darker value. As you can see above right, when the image is converted to gray scale, the shadows are almost the same value as the brightest part of the bush.

In the images below, the lightest green on the right edge is right next to the darkest shadow. The shadow is a "real" dark, not just a mid tone. You have to give the viewer two shapes *next to each other* to compare the value difference.



I recommend a light wash of orange paint as you can see on the rocks on the image above left. If you insist on using a yellow, pick a bright one that's either neutral (with no blue or red) or a warm yellow that has a little red in it. Some painters just leave the sunlight as unpainted white paper, but that pure white is so strong that it will probably be interpreted as glare.

time! No more hoping that what's in a tube you have will be close enough. And now you'll know what the perfect color really is – for that still life background, for the trees in your landscape (no more boring sap green!) or how to make the perfect skin tones for portraits. Make shadows that *glow* and darks that aren't just a boring gray or black.

Debbie finds the textural quality of paint an exciting element of painting as much as design, composition, and color. Evoking an emotional response to a 'sense of place', and observing the way the sun and shadows interplay is a delight which that she hopes to share with her viewers.
